Shirley Community Reserve is not considered to be surplus to requirement by the Parks Team at Council. We're generally aiming to locate local parks 500 m from a residential property (so within walking distance). If Shirley Community Reserve was not in that location, the nearest local park to those living in the area would be approximately 1.4 km to MacFarlane Park or 800 m to Petrie Park. The original idea of the location being at McFarlane Park was not suitable, as it doesn't have the set back needed for this type of facility, the closest residential property is 30 m away and it does not have the suitable setback. Permanent skate facilities still need to be placed at least 40 m from



This is the distance the Council works to due to previous noise testing of permanent skate parks. While permanent skate surfaces can create less noise, it's the dropping and landing of skateboards that can create noise and requires the 40 m setback. At Shirley Community Reserve the nearest residential property is approximately 46 m away from the proposed location.</p> <p>A permanent skate park/pump track would cost three or four times more than a temporary pump track. There's a considerable amount of planning and community consultation that's required to find a suitable location for a permanent facility, and can take 2-3 years. At this stage, there's no funding available in the LTP (Long Term Plan) for a permanent skate/scooter facility in the area.</p> <p>A temporary pump track is both quicker and cheaper to install and it could remain in place for up to 10 years if that's what the community want. This allows the Council to make use of the site while allowing time for planning and funding of permanent uses for this site and other facilities in the area.</p>

The temporary pump track funding has been granted through the Council Capital Endowment Fund and the table is funded from the Community Board Discretionary Fund. The Capital Endowment Fund is interest generated from invested funds, so it's not ratepayer funded. The temporary pump track met the criteria for this funding as it provides a new and modern area for children, young adults and other community members in Shirley, and other locations into the future. As the track is relocatable, it is considered to be good value for money. There is an existing signalised pedestrian crossing facility on Shirley Road adjacent to the site. This project is focussed on utilising this site now the Community Centre is no longer there. Putting the table/pump track at another location would mean Shirley Community Reserve still remains unutilised.

This location will severely increase traffic and noise pollution. At present the half court basketball area attracts people playing from early in the morning until late in the evening, not only with the noise, carrying onto our property from playing (i.e. bouncing and rebounding) but the yelling screaming and loud music from boom boxes. This location already attracts people driving into the reserve and playing loud music from their cars, while they play basketball, or watch their children on the playground. This behaviour will increase with a pump track. There is also a huge amount of litter left which not only blows around the reserve but across the street, onto the road and gutters.</p> <p>In early 2017 (via Trevor Cattermole) and March 2018, we were engaged with the Council regarding rebuilding the Community Centre (via Stacey Holbrough) and we have not heard any movement until now regarding proposals for the site. 

From what I have heard and read there is a core group of motivated community members who want a clear division between Richmond North (Innes) and South (central). The North area clearly have different requirements to South of North Avon Rd. You mentioned a form of community managed of the site is your preference, I agree, but as above the community needs to be clearly defined and a framework put in place to support the organisation.</p> <p>The community center comes next or at least partially during the reinstatement of the community.</p> <p>This then leads to the how to fund/rebuild a community center. The Capital Endowment Fund is interest generated from invested funds, so it's not ratepayer funded. The temporary pump track met the criteria for this funding as it provides a new and modern area for children, young adults and other community members in Shirley, and other locations into the future. As the track is relocatable, it is considered to be good value for money.</p> <p>A permanent skate park/pump track would cost three or four times more than a temporary pump track. There is a considerable amount of planning and community consultation that is required to find a suitable location for a permanent facility, and can take 2-3 years. At this stage, there is no funding available in the LTP (Long Term Plan) for a permanent skate/scooter facility in the area.</p> <p>A temporary pump track is both quicker and cheaper to install and it could remain in place for up to 10 years if that is what the community wants. This allows the Council to make use of the site while allowing time for planning and funding of a permanent skate facility in the area</p> <p>The next LTP is in 2021 therefore the Community Board will be looking at what is happening in Shirley, Redwood and Papanui to develop their submissions around 10 year plans.
